Flower Communion Service

In September we will hold a Flower Communion Service at Elder Yard for the very first time and below is a short introduction about this service.

The Flower communion service was created by Norbert Capek (1870-1942), who founded the Unitarian Church in Czechoslovakia. He introduced this special service to that church on June 4, 1923. For some time he had felt the need for some symbolic ritual that would bind people more closely together. The format had to be one that would not alienate any who had forsaken other religious traditions.

The traditional Christian communion service with bread and wine was unacceptable to the members of his congregation because of their strong reaction against

the Catholic faith. So, he turned to the native beauty of their countryside for elements of a

communion which would be genuine to them and the Flower Communion service was the result. It was such a success that it spread to many Unitarian and Unitarian Universalist congregation around the world.

People were asked to bring a flower of their choice, either from their own gardens. or from the field or roadside. When they arrived at church a large vase stood waiting in the vestibule, each person was asked to place their own flower in the vase. This signified that it was by their own free will they joined with the others. The vase that contained all the flowers was a symbol of the united church fellowship and was placed at the front at the beginning of the service.

After the service, as people left the church, they went to the vase and each took a flower from the vase other than the one that they had brought.

The significance of the flower communion is that as no two flowers are alike, so no two people are alike, yet each has a contribution to make. Together the different flowers form a beautiful bouquet. Our common bouquet would not be the same without the unique addition of each individual flower, and thus it is with the community at Elder Yard, it would not be the same without each and every one of us. Thus, this service is a statement of our community. By exchanging flowers, we show our willingness to walk together in our Search for truth, disregarding all that might divide us. Each person takes home a flower brought by someone else - thus symbolizing our shared celebration in community.

So, bring a flower on the 14th of September and let us celebrate together!

Terminally III End of Life Bill

On 25th June 2025 the Bill was passed in the House of Commons and will no proceed to the House of Lords. The General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Christian Churches welcomed this development, having consulted with congregations in 2013 to find out if there was a consensus about this.

Did you know?

In July

1913, Eastwood Park at Hasland was opened by Alderman George Eastwood's niece. He had donated Hasland House and the adjoining land to the local community. From 2006 to 2012 local activism and funding applications for Lottery funding enabled the park to be restored and improved.

In August,

1662, 24 August (St Bartholomew's Day) -The Act of Uniformity 1662 stated that any minister who refused to conform to the 1662 Book of Common Prayer by St Bartholomew's day should be ejected from the Church of England. This resulted in some Anglican ministers being ejected from their roles and it became known as the Great Ejection. These dissenting ministers lost their homes and livelihoods but many went on to establish dissenting congregations, including in Chesterfield. (This has been covered in previous summer newsletters, but such is the significance of it... perhaps it should be included annually?)

1857, Spital Cemetery was opened. This was due to the general demand for burial spaces and to provide burial space for non-conformists who did not wish

to be buried in accordance with the rights of the Church of England. In 1859 an area of the cemetery was consecrated for Catholic burials.
